This weekend, Reform are gathering in Birmingham at their annual Party Conference.

Nigel Farage and his colleagues will complain. They will shout. They will blame. But they won't have answers. They never do.

Reform know what they don't like. But they don't know how they would fix things. And that's why Nigel Farage's favourite answer is:

You might think Nigel Farage's party has a clear position on immigration - after all, they talk about it a lot. But on asylum, after spending months trying to come up with a policy on mass deportations, it took just 24 hours for the plan to start unravelling. They just can't explain how the plan will work.

Nigel Farage has long called for an insurance-based system of healthcare, but asked what Reform would replace the current NHS model with, he says "I don't know the answer yet."



When it comes to the Online Safety Act, Reform want to scrap it but they don't know what they want to put in its place.

Again and again, Reform announce what sounds like a policy, and then row back from it. On crime, Farage bragged that Reform would send the most serious criminals to El Salvador, then admitted that it "may be a quite extreme example". On steel, he said that Reform would reopen blast furnaces in Port Talbot, then admitted, "That's impossible". Lots of bluster again, but no substance.

Anger without answers can only get you so far. "Don't Know" doesn't put more money in people's pockets, "Don't Know" doesn't fix the NHS, and "Don't Know" doesn't control immigration.

But until Reform work out what they want, not just what they hate, their Don't Know manifesto is all they have to offer.

ASYLUM

REFORM'S POLICY

Detain and then deport all illegal migrants. But where will they be detained? Does that include women and children? What incentives will be provided to countries like Iran?

"I'm not going to be drawn on the specifics of any individual geographical location."

Never. That shouldn't be done.

What Labour is doing

Labour is fixing the broken asylum system we inherited. Asylum decision-making has more than doubled, and the number of people in hotels fell by nearly 6,000 in the first three months of 2025. We've introduced stronger measures to cut the backlog and have committed to ending the use of asylum hotels completely by the end of this Parliament. We've already returned more than 35,000 people with no right to be in the UK – a 13% increase on the previous year. We're restoring order to the asylum system so that it operates swiftly, firmly and fairly.

Cap the number of people coming to the UK on essential worker visas. What will that number be?

What Reform is saying:

Sam Coates: Will you put a cap on the number of people who can come in under your essential skills exemption, particularly in healthcare for people that come into the country.

Nigel Farage: By the time of the next election, we will. I can't tell you the numbers right now, I don't have all of the figures.

Sam Coates: So you are committing to a cap on the numbers of [-interrupted] **Nigel Farage:** You ask me in four years alright? Ask me in four years' time. You can play whatever silly games you want right now.

What Labour is doing

Labour supports the Online Safety Act, which protects children and adults online, making social media companies and search services more responsible for their users' safety on their platforms.

The Strongest protections in the Act have been designed for children. Platforms will be required to prevent children from accessing harmful and age-inappropriate content, such as material on suicide, self-harm, eating disorders and pornography, 90 people have been convicted of offences under the Online Safety Act since it came into force, with at least 22 receiving custodial sentences.

DIGITAL ID

REFORM'S POLICY

Digital ID won't work. Or it will. Don't introduce it. Or do.

What Reform is saying:

"I would not trust this government with digital ID. I have to say I didn't particularly enjoy the vaccine passport phase that we lived through. And as for the argument, oh, it'll stop crime, it'll stop illegal immigration, it'll stop illegal working. Well, I don't think digital ID will stop teenage girls being raped. I don't think digital ID will stop the drugs gangs. I don't think digital ID will stop illegal working. Frankly, what it's more likely to do is to impinge upon the law-abiding majority."

PRISONS

Send some of Britain's most violent criminals to El Salvador... or maybe not El Salvador...

"So, if we can send some of our worst violent criminals overseas to serve their terms, then yes. And if that means that Ian Huntley goes to El Salvador, well, our attitude is: so be it. So we're serious about it"

The Conservatives left the prisons service on the point of collapse, adding fewer than 500 cells to the prison estate over 14 years. The Labour Government has already opened 2,500 new prison places, and has committed to building four new prisons over the next seven years. This includes £2.3 billion towards prison builds over the next two years, with a target to open up 14,000 places by 2031.

WATER INDUSTRY

Bring 50% of the water industry into public ownership at a cost of

What Labour is doing

We've started the biggest overhaul of the water sector in a generation to clean up our rivers, lakes and seas. Labour will cut sewage pollution in half by 2030, as well as abolish Ofwat to establish a single, powerful regulator to prevent harmful water pollution and protect families from bill hikes.

And we've banned unfair bonuses for six water companies with immediate effect, to stop water company executives being rewarded for pollution.

CLEAN ENERGY INVESTMENT

REFORM'S POLICY

Strike down contracts for clean energy investment. Or maybe not.

"We intend to win the next election, and if elected - or if we hold the balance of power - we will immediately reassess all Net Zero-related commitments. We will prioritise cost, reliability and security of supply over spurious decarbonisation targets, and as a first step, we will seek to strike down all contracts signed under AR7. Should you choose to participate, you should treat any long-term revenue streams as politically and commercially unsafe."

You're saying, if ever you need to come back and talk about some variation, we will be as harsh as we possibly can be with you. We're not going to be kind of compliant. That's the political risk. So it's not you're going to renege on contracts...
